LO: To be able to use conjunctions and connectives to extend sentences.

 When we write we need to make our work interesting for someone to read. We do this by using some short, some medium and some long sentences.

Connectives and conjunctions are words or phrases that link sentences or clauses with in a sentence together - they make longer sentences.

- Conjunctions join two sentences together and make medium length sentences.
- Connectives join two, three or more parts of a sentence (clauses) together to make long sentences.

Conjunctions

There are two types of conjunction:

Co-ordinating conjunctions join two sentences together when both sentences are important.

and, but, so, or

Subordinating conjunctions join two sentences together when one sentence needs the other so that the writing makes sense to the reader.

when, while, before, after, since, until, if, because, although, that

Subordinating conjunctions: when, while, before, after, since, until, if, because, although, that

Connectives


There are several types of connective:

- For adding information: also, furthermore, moreover
- To say something opposite to what you have already said: however, nevertheless, on the other hand
- To make your point even better: besides, anyway, after all
- To explain: for example, in other words, that is to say
- To write a list: first(ly), first of all, finally
- To tell the reader the result of what you have already written: therefore, consequently, as a result
- To tell the reader the time when something happened: just then, meanwhile, later, suddenly


