In closing, a thank you to all students and their families who will be moving on at the end of term to college, apprenticeships or the workplace; I wish you all well.

## **Geography Field Trips**

### Year 9 Trip to Herne Bay

Year 9 went to Herne Bay in May to investigate whether the beach was moving. We carried out various experiments and determined that yes, long-shore drift was in action on that beach. ### Year 8 Trip to Horton Kirby

This term Year 8 went on their geography field trip to Horton Kirby. Year 8 have been studying rivers and our question was 'How Clean is the River Darent in Horton Kirby?' We did various experiments on the river looking at depth and velocity to find the answer to the question. By far the most popular experiment of the day was hunting for minibeasts. The types of river life you find is a good indicator of how clean a river is. The weather was excellent and a great day was had by all.



## History and RE Trips

### Year 7 Lullingstone Roman Villa

A part of the history curriculum in Key Stage 3, pupils have to complete a study about their local history. At Grange Park we have linked it with the topic of *Romans* that Year 7 have been working on. So that the pupils could experience life in Roman times first hand, they visited Lullingstone Roman Villa near Eynsford. Whilst there, pupils worked hard and completed a booklet about aspects of Roman life. They were also able to see Roman artefacts and gain more knowledge about what life was like in Roman Britain.

## KS5 Alternative Curriculum at Wrotham


We have visited a fair few places as part of my timetable now.
