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I'm going to show you some words on the board - if you think it is important to you, then give me a thumbs up - if not, it's thumbs down.



An example at school: Our student council






· The rule of the law

Our school rules






Individual Liberty

Respectable and mature opinions in class discussions/debates






Mutual Respect
