Our Stansted site is now full for the first time since we opened and the staff there have excelled in continuing to develop an immersive curriculum. Each team I meet with heads I am reminded how lucky I am to lead a remarkable team of staff.

Those of you who have been in school at events or attended parents evening or annuals reviews will know how committed the staff are. I think those who have not been through a normal Grange Park Christmas have been surprised how much we pack into the last few days. Without their help and enthusiasm, these events would not be so wonderful. I had the pleasure of joining the elves and Santa, seeing those smiling faces brings me so much joy. During the church service I shed a tear as I was not prepared for the solo singing. For too many of our children, these whole school events have been negative, so it is wonderful to see them confidently contribute to a performance, poem, reading or a song. I will of course keep you updated with any developments and county changes. I will always fight for what's best for Grange Park and the pupils.

Next term we welcome back Mrs Rose who returns from maternity leave. Mrs Rose, Mr Dark and Mrs Hume will be leading some exciting whole school projects, more information will be shared by them next term.

We now have all the PE kit information and we will send these new kits home once Casey's have completed the order. Thank you to those of you who contacted me to share your gratitude for the new free PE kit.

Thank you for all your support and trust. I am so great full to have your support; together we are stronger. I do hope that you all have a lovely break and I wish you and your loved ones a very Merry Christmas.

### Message from the Chairman of Governors

It's that time of year when some might hear the jingle of bells and the sound of reindeer hooves on the roof but Christmas is not always an easy time for some especially this year with the costs of living spiraling ever upwards and the money in our pockets not stretching as far as we would wish.

After a lot of searching, I am delighted to confirm that Kristie Horley and Katherine Davies are our two newly-elected Parent Governors who have already attended their first Full Governing Body meeting, as well as attending the Teaching and Learning Committee. They are going to be an asset and all governors are looking forward to working with them.



Governors are immensely proud of our pupils and staff for the fantastic exam results they enjoyed this summer. All the hard work put in by our students paid off in spades, and it was an absolute pleasure when the results were shared with us.

As some of you may know, Grange Park is one of the founder members of the Kent Special Education Needs Trust (KsENT) - a body which represents the 26 special schools in Kent and, as I am sure many also know, County received a second damning report on its Special Needs provision when Ofsted revisited earlier this Autumn. This report has galvanized County into an action plan on a six-month timescale to conclude in June next year. Miss Atwell and myself feel this is rushed and the implications of it has not been thought through. This plan is designed to get as many children with special needs into mainstream education as possible and laudable though this might well be, one size does not fit all.

There has been a recent meeting between County, Headteachers of Special Schools and Chairs of Governors, at which County officers did acknowledge that Special School Headteachers were the experts in the room and in Ofsted terms, with the exception of one school, all Kent special schools are either 'Good' or 'Outstanding' (we are currently rated as 'Good' but as it's six years since our last inspection, sooner rather than later we are expecting Ofsted Inspectors to visit).

We understand there is also a concern with regard to issuing EHCPs with those granting them seemingly dragging their feet for an assortment of reasons that is difficult to get to the bottom of but this is not helpful to either schools or parents. In the latest Ofsted report, the LA was criticized for the length of time it took for parents to get any sort of answer by either telephone or email – this problem is faced by Headteachers too on a daily basis.

We would like County to work more closely with us and the expertise that undoubtedly we have, to be constructive not destructive or obstructive. This is all very worrying, but we are "on the case" and will update you from time to time.

In these difficult times, I wish you and yours peace and joy in this coming Christmas time.

### Duke of Edinburgh Award



The Duke of Edinburgh award is for 14-24 year-olds who can do a

DofE programme at one of three progressive levels which, when successfully completed, leads to a Bronze, Silver or Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Award.

There are four sections to complete at Bronze and Silver level and five at Gold. They involve helping the community/environment, becoming fitter, developing new skills, planning, training for and completing an expedition and, for Gold only, working with a team on a residential activity. Any young person can do their DofE – regardless of ability, gender, background or location. Achieving an Award isn't a competition or about being first. It's all about setting personal challenges and pushing personal boundaries.




The drawing group chose a type of drawing skill, and then researched and developed this into a final piece.

# Key Stage 3 - Take One Picture

Key Stage 3 have taken part in a project inspired by the painting, *A Shipwreck in Stormy Seas*, by Claude-Joseph Vernet, 1773

The project took them on a creative journey that involved looking at art from around the world. Topics included: Trade, travel and slavery, colonialism and imperialism and non-Western art. We combined this with Black History month and explored how different cultures are represented in the art world.

Year 7 made clay boats with printed sails that linked to their identity. This was inspired by Yinka Shonibare's sculpture *Nelson's Ship in a Bottle.* 





Year 8 made clay shackles and anti-slavery coins.



# Year 9: The Benin Bronzes and Picasso

Year 9 have started their project about the Benin Bronzes. They have learnt how the people of Benin made elaborate bronze sculptures over 600 years ago by using the lost wax method.

Year 9 have also explored the impact of colonisation and imperialism and the consequences it incurred in Benin.

They are now linking this work to their artist study of Picasso, and the impact that African art had on the Western art world during the 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> centuries.

Year 9 have been designing masks doing grid drawing and creating abstract fruit faces inspired by Picasso!



Year 10 have started their project about portraiture. They have been developing their portrait drawing and painting skills and have looked at the work of Vincent van Gogh as their first artist study.

Year 11 are finishing off their portfolio projects and have produced some excellent final art studies.







### Cookery

We are very lucky that our pupils are able to access a fully equipped kitchen and to work with wonderful produce and ingredients each week in their cookery lessons. The confidence and skills that are developed is really impressive and the pupils enjoy some of the independence they get when making their dishes in class.

So far this year pupils have been making a wide variety of dishes in their cookery lessons. Key stage 3 have been busy developing a range of food preparation skills and have cooked a wide variety of dishes including pizza and scones. This was a great opportunity for the year 8 pupils to practice their knife skills with some really impressive results. They have been following a number of recipes and have taken home soups, macaroni cheese, breads and Thai green curry.



Year 9 have been working hard in broadening their knowledge and have produced some wonderful dishes including burgers and wedges, focaccia bread and have baked biscuits which were dipped in chocolate.

Year 10 have been working hard to follow more complicated recipes and are working towards planning and cooking a nutritious family meal with a pudding for up to four people. Towards the end of term, they have been getting into the festive spirit making some amazing Christmas cakes which they then hand decorated.



# Year 11 - Operation Christmas Child

Our year 11's participated in Operation Christmas Child this year, as part of our ongoing Rights Respecting work at school. They made 11 boxes and delivered these to a local church to be sent which will be sent overseas. Pupils discussed which project they wanted to support, coordinated and filled the shoeboxes, and then passed them on to the drop off point. A big thank you to all the families and staff who made donations to the appeal. We are sure that they gifts will be much appreciated, wherever in the world they are sent to.









### Christmas 2022

As always, Christmas at Grange Park is a very special time of year. Following on from our Christmas afternoon for the Stansted pupils, we descended to St George's church at Wrotham for our annual Christmas service. It was lovely for the school to be able to come together and also to be able to welcome so many parents to join us.

We were treated to some fantastic singing from our Stansted pupils, a nativity from the Year 9 pupils, some wonderful readings and prayers and a beautiful solo from one of our Year 10 pupils.

So much time and effort goes into rehearsals and this really paid off, as the performances were outstanding. The snow made it a very cold, but incredibly Christmassy celebration. Following on from church, parents were invited to come back to the Wrotham site for tea and a mince pie, and it was lovely to be able to meet with so many of you.

At lunch, all the pupils and staff were treated to Mrs Hazelden's wonderful Christmas dinner, which as always, was thoroughly enjoyed by everybody. The floristry pupils made some beautiful table decorations which looked lovely and festive. There was such a vibrant and happy atmosphere, and we all left with very full bellies! The afternoon saw all the pupils join in the school quiz, which as always, is lots of fun.



### The Samsung 2022 Solve for Tomorrow: Next Gen Competition

In September, Samsung Electronics Co., Ltd announced the winners of the second iteration of the Solve for Tomorrow: Next Gen Competition following a summer of workshops and ideas generation. This year, the programme encouraged 11-15 year olds across the UK to learn about the basics of Design Thinking, careers in STEM, and to create and submit their own ideas of how technology could solve a societal issue.

As part of Samsung's ongoing mission to defy barriers to help young people from all backgrounds find their purpose in tomorrow's world, Solve for Tomorrow: Next Gen seeks to empower the next generation of innovators, inviting students aged 11-15 to imagine a better world. The programme provides free online resources for schools, youth groups and families to help inspire the next generation of innovators. In 2022, young people learnt the basics of 'Design Thinking' and got a glimpse into creative STEM careers such as design and marketing with employees from Samsung. They then used everything they learnt to inspire their entries for the Solve for Tomorrow: Next Gen Competition, with 481 entries submitted to the judging panel. Entries from Grange Park were submitted by Mrs Chilvers.

This August, a panel of five Samsung judges named the 2022 winners of the competition. In the 13-15 age category Finn and Josh from year 10, were chosen as winners with their idea 'Bin'. This smart bin educates users about the journey of their rubbish, aiming to increase recycling.

Finn and Josh both received a Samsung Galaxy phone, and will get a VIP invitation to a Samsung event later this year.

This is an incredible achievement and Grange Park is incredibly proud of Finn and Josh for being so creative and demonstrating their STEM skills.



### Interoception

The Therapy team at Grange Park do lots of work with pupils throughout the school on Interoception.

Interoception can help us identify our emotions, which in turn, helps us to self regulate.

Years 5/6, 7, 9 and Key Stage 5 have been trying out lots of experiments. Interoception is the sense of noticing our body signals and connecting to emotions to help us to develop our self-awareness. The pupils have had fun focusing on a different body part each week to draw attention to how it feels and have used amazing adjectives to do this.

It's important that staff fully participate too, and they are always ready to get stuck in!

There are lots of things you can try at home to see how different things make you feel, here are some simple examples to try when we are focusing on the skin.

There are a wide variety of lunch clubs each day for pupils across both sites.

Music club at Wrotham is very popular, with Mr Huggins working with the pupils on some songs by The Ramones, and also a Christmas song written by Jamie in Key Stage 5 called 'Christmas Without You'. We currently have 2 drummers, 2 keyboard players and a dozen guitarists, who are making some incredible sounds!

We also hold a very popular Life Skills club which runs on a Thursday, and pupils can build on their cookery skills. Pupils decide each week what they would like to make, and then their creativity in the kitchen is set free. There are always some incredible dishes at the end of the session.











# Key Stage 5

### London Preparing for Adulthood Trip

Kay Stage 5 had been working hard to earn their first reward trip, and in October. they went to London for the day. This trip was chosen, planned and organised by themselves including the travel, tickets, timetable, lunch stops and what was the most cost efficient way of getting there. We travelled by train and tube, walked over Westminster bridge to the London Eye. As we were walking around London, the students saw a range of London landmarks and the student's behaviour was impeccable all day, Well done Key Stage 5.



### Work Experience at the Farm

For Key Stage 5 Work Experience this term, they have visited the new cows at Leybourne Chase, which is part of Trottiscliffe Farm. The cows were so friendly that students could hand feed them and stroke them.

Most of the students had never been this close to farm animals and they really enjoyed being with them.

I am also supported by a Learning Mentor from the Grange Park Partnership who are normally Toni, Sue or Renu. I enjoy this course because it allows me to get better with my skills in the kitchen and perhaps become a professional chef.'

# **IQM** Award

In October, we were awarded the IQM Inclusive School Award with Flagship Status. This was a fantastic achievement, and here are some of the key findings about the school from their report.

#### Student voice

'Student voice is far from tokenistic at Grange Park School with every opportunity taken to ensure students are able to express their contributions to school life, from choosing their subjects, to choosing activities for lunchtime clubs. The school has two elected 'head pupil' positions. These were originally named 'head boy' and 'head girl' until a pupil raised the question as to why they were gender specific. The school has focused on celebrating diversity and is working hard to overcome stereotypes. An excellent example of this is inviting a past pupil back to school to talk to present pupils about his sexuality and coping methods he has used successfully.'

#### Staff speak highly of support available

'Leaders are not afraid to have difficult conversations with parents and professionals if needed and always have the needs of the pupil central to decisions that are made. This extends to a shift in culture in supporting staff to have difficult conversations with students about future aspirations and ensuring that conversations are honest and result in suitable and purposeful qualifications and work experience.'

#### Extra-curricular activities are vast

'Leaders prioritise transition across the provision and recognise that learners need personalised transition programmes to support needs. Grange Park School has a multi-disciplinary approach to transition led by the transition lead. Learner and parent voices are a very important part of this process. Leaders and staff from Grange Park School regularly visit the different sites. This informal handover very effectively supports learners' transitions.

Parents speak very highly of the school and give credit to the personalised approaches that allow their children to reach their potential. Parents are delighted that their children are supported to be themselves and build their self-confidence. It is clear that the transdisciplinary approach is very well received with parents praising the holistic support their children have. Constructive relationships were highlighted during the meeting with parents grateful to have a voice and input into their children's school life. They described staff as 'going above and beyond' for their children and always visible at school events.

Grange Park School is truly pupil centred and staff work tirelessly to overcome any barriers pupils may face. Leaders pride themselves on starting with a problem and working out what needs to happen to overcome, regardless of resources, and then working out how to make it work for the school.'

We also recommend parents sign up for Email alerts on the Kent Closures website. This service will send an email alert to let parents know if Grange Park School is closed. Local radio will sometimes provide information of school closures.

We will also endeavour to inform you via our text messaging service (Parentmail), so please ensure we have your current mobile number.

#### How will we let you know if the college is closed?
