Grange Park celebrated 'No Pens Wednesday' again this year on 24th November.


'No Pens Wednesday' is an initiative from the

The Forest School enrichment option has also been very popular this term, with pupils using tools, making camps and shelters and enjoying being outside.




Children in Need

School Gateway & School dinner bookings


Since September, we have moved to using the School Gateway app to book school dinners. This is a quick and easy way for us to provide numbers to the kitchen so that they can prepare the correct amount of dinners for the pupils.



Thank you to all those who are booking school meals daily. The menus for the new term are uploaded before the end of term, and you can book dinners for a single day, a week, or the term if you prefer. If your child will be having a school dinner, please can you ensure that you are making their booking by 9.00am on the day so that the kitchen can be fully prepared. If your child is in receipt of free school meals, please ensure that you book in the same way, and the app will not charge you for the meal.

Please download the School Gateway app, and make your bookings via the 'Dinner' section. All payments can be made through the payment option.

We politely request that meal balances are paid weekly to avoid building up any large debts. If you need any help with the app or making payment, then please do not hesitate to contact the school office who will be happy to help.

British Museum Trip

Our Stansted pupils enjoyed reading a book called the World of Robots before meeting the author Joe Craig. It was great to ask Joe questions and show off the work, including predictions of his stories, to him.





PSHE Day

During Term 1 we held our first PSHE focus day with a theme of 'Thinking of Others'. We

learned about Kindness and Empathy and raised money for MacMillan Cancer Support by having a Coffee Afternoon at both Wrotham and Stansted.

Our second focus day had a theme of 'Choices and Consequences' where we focused on antibullying by wearing odd socks and learning through different subjects including Art and Sci-



ence. Most pupils met with our local police representative to talk about keeping safe and the laws that affect young people, while Year 11 attended a workshop run by the Kinsella Trust about Knife Crime. Our next focus in on Money Matters.





Year 7 Trips

Wildwood

During Term 1 we visited Wildwood Wildlife Park.

We were very excited to see the pack of wolves and climb over the wobbly bridge above the bear enclosure.

We also had lots of fun playing in the park at the end of the day too!





Bodium Castle

This term, we went on a trip to Bodiam Castle as part of our History learning. We were able to spot all the features that we have been learning about in class including arrow slots and murder holes. Some pupils enjoyed climbing the narrow, steep spiral staircases to reach the top of the towers.





Wrotham

Art

Years 7 and 8 have been very creative over the past two terms, participating in a project based on Orazio Gentieschi's 'The Finding of Moses'.

They really liked how the figures in the painting looked like they were moving and this inspired them to create moving sketches in pastels. We linked this to the artwork of Degas and Keith Haring and even had an 80's disco where volunteers danced, freezing when the music stopped so that we could draw them!

Pupils also focused on the baby in the painting, and had great fun creating moulds of baby heads in clay and making plaster casts of them.

This forms part of the Take One Picture project with The National Gallery. We have submitted our work which we hope will be chosen for display in the Gallery next summer.





Edgar Degas and Capturing Movement

Pupils used pastels to quickly draw the outlines of the dancers in a film.

The dance will be paused for a few seconds, so they didn't have long to try to capture the shapes and lines of the dancers.

The sketches were overlapped using different coloured pastels to create a sense of movement.







Keith Haring Disco!



Pupils enjoyed a disco full of 1980's music where they had to dance and then freeze in their dance pose! The rest of the class had to draw them in the style of Keith Haring, drawing thick black lines around the figures and add movement lines radiating out of their images.







Cookery

We have had some amazing dishes made in cookery this term. From hearty cottage pies, delicious cinnamon swirls and even Thai green curry.

Pupils have been busy over the past few weeks making delicious treats for the festive season.

Severe Snow/Ice Plan

How will we let you know that school (Wrotham & Stansted sites) is closed?

If we do experience severe snow/ice resulting in hazardous conditions, Miss Atwell may have to take the decision to close the school. Once this decision has been made, we will notify parents via the Kent Closures website.

To determine whether Grange Park School is open or closed, please visit www.kentclosures.co.uk. Search for the school in the search box. The Kent closures website may also be used to find out if other services in Kent are open or closed, such as nurseries, children's centres and libraries.

We also recommend parents sign up for Email alerts on the Kent Closures website. This service will send an email alert to let parents know if Grange Park School is closed. Local radio will sometimes provide information of school closures.

We will also endeavour to inform you via our text messaging service (Parentmail), so please ensure we have your current mobile number.

How will we let you know if the college is closed?

If we do experience severe snow/ice resulting in hazardous conditions:-

Parents and students should follow the guidance from the college site that their son/daughter is currently attending.

Due to the varied locations of each campus, the college may make a decision to close, one site or all sites, or remain open, dependent on the severity of the weather at each campus.

Parents and students should go to Google, log on to the main MKC or Hadlow home page, the college will provide information should it be open or closed, this is usually highlighted in yellow, at the top of the page. The college will update the information on a daily basis.

Tutors will email students with set work to be completed at home for each snow day.

Partnership students will not be requested to travel or work at the School site, if the college is closed and the school is open.
