Mental Health & Wellbeing

Grange Park Vision Statement

'To ensure that all Grange Park Community have the skills and belief that they can overcome any barriers. They learn how to use tools to independently self-regulate and so maintain good Mental Health and Wellbeing.'

We have been busy gathering evidence and working towards our Wellbeing Award.

Thank you all for taking time to complete the online survey last term. The survey highlighted some areas for development, as well as those areas in which we already excel.

It was humbling to read the positive scores and comments from parents. Parents recognised that the school cares about the emotional wellbeing and mental health of everyone involved in the school. One parent commented, '*Many of the children have similar backgrounds and the school show incred-ible caring and understanding with huge success. The care extends to families and staff, and the Head especially is always approachable.*'

We were also pleased with the high number of parents who felt comfortable talking about their child's emotional wellbeing and Mental Health with school. One parent simply said '*Yes I would and I do as I know that they will support me brilliantly*.'

Whilst parents were pleased with what we do to support their children's Mental Health and Wellbeing, the pupils gave us some areas for improvement.

Pupils acknowledged the we care and they felt confident in knowing how they could get help. However, many did not feel that they could make a difference if someone else is feeling worried or unhappy. They also that said that they feel uncomfortable talking about how they are feeling at school.

Not only will these issues be added to the School Council agenda, we have also started a Peer Mentoring system which enables some of the older pupils to help their younger peers. This takes the form of an informal lunchtime session, where the pupils meet and have the chance to chat about any concerns they may have.

Another stipulation of our Wellbeing award is to form a group of Wellbeing Champions. We have had a number of volunteers and watch this space for details of how they plan to promote and maintain positive Wellbeing throughout the school.

We are currently looking at developing our Mental Health and Wellbeing section of the website. We will be adding a Signposting Document soon to give you places to find support for different areas of Mental Health issues and struggles. If there is anything specific you think would be helpful for us to put on the website, we would be happy to hear your suggestions.



Forest School



We have been extremely busy in Forest School with a focus being placed on trees, mud and sticks. Year 5 and 6 have enjoyed experimenting with mud and using sticks as paintbrushes along with using charcoal to create bark rubbings that made wonderful works of art.

Year 7 and 8 enjoyed being creative with the mud and producing hand prints and 3D art work. They have also made stick gnomes and learnt knots to enable then to make photo frames and bows.




Key Stage 5 Travel Training
