Headteacher Letter

This has been an incredibly busy term where pupils have benefitted from some wonderful experiences that broaden the learning and enhance their life experiences. For the first time in two years pupils have sat public examinations. Pupils rose the challenge, demonstrating reliance and determination.

Our pupils at Stansted sat the SATS in May, a first for us as a school and I am delighted with how well they managed and the outcomes they achieved. For too many of our pupils, they have had very negative experiences of assessment but we have seen with the right support they build confidence and access more than anyone had ever predicted.

This week we have had our first annual prom with Year 11 and KS5 leavers from Wrotham in attendance. The Moat provided the most incredible space for our pupils, who enjoyed a delicious meal and disco. There was dancing until late despite it being the hottest day on record. This is now hopefully an annual tradition we can continue for many years to come.

The weather sadly led to the cancellation of sports day but we hope that Mrs Hughes will be able to plan an event for September for the pupils to enjoy.

We have been busy at the secondary site improving our teaching spaces; we have a new science room, English room with library and we are developing a performing arts space. The talent show is always a wonderful reminder of the pupils capabilities and this is something we want to develop further.

I am incredibly grateful this week for the air conditioning the governors agreed to install just before Covid. All our teaching spaces have air conditioning and this allowed us to have an environment where the pupils were comfortable and not overwhelmed by the heat.

Over the summer, work will start on the flat roof. Since the school was built, we have had reoccurring issues that have been temporarily fixed, but KCC will now remove and replace the front roof. The work will start next week and could continue into spring. The contractor did complete the work to the back roof and they have a good understanding of the need of our pupils. For safety, some of the outdoor spaces will be out of bounds and our chickens have been moved and are now with Mrs Somerford. There will be some very ugly scaffolding up when the children return in September, but it will be worth it when we have a roof that no longer leaks and damages our school.

It was lovely to have seen so many of you at the talent show and BBQ. The burgers were particularly good this year. My thanks goes to all who donated raffle prizes or bought tickets. We raised £770 which will fund the coach for the children to go to Chessington World of Adventures in September.


The staff have already started to plan some wonderful experiences for our children next year. I am excited to welcome a new academic year, new families and children.

Message from the Chair of Governors

On looking back over this past academic year and watching pupils emerge from the fog of the last 18 months or so that Covid brought with it, I am happily amazed at how our students have coped with the disruption to their lives and moved forward. The whole school (staff and students) have had to cope with changing regulations on an almost daily basis but the time has come when we must look forward and continue to utilise new skills gained through online learning as well as face-to-face learning, rather than looking back at how tough it was at the time.



All our pupils have worked hard throughout the year, especially so with end of year exams. Those that are leaving us are going on to positive destinations, mostly into further training. Our Deputy Head Boy has written to a number of people of influence inviting them to visit our school. His letters were impressive and brought results and he continued to impress our guests when giving them a conducted tour of the school.

Miss Atwell deservedly won two accolades as Head Teacher of the Year – one for the West Kent Area and the other for the whole of the County of Kent. Her pastoral care of all pupils, their families/carers and staff was second to none with the school moving forward rather than standing still. The wellbeing of our staff is a concern of the governing body and governors regularly check that all is as well as it can be.

Governors have met virtually since March 2020 but I am pleased to report that our last Full Governing Body meeting at the beginning of July was a blended meeting of face-to-face and virtual. After such a long time it was rather good to see almost everyone around the table rather than on screen, although I think blended meetings will probably be the norm for the future. We still have one Parent Governor vacancy shortly to become two when Gillian Buisson's term of office ends in October. Due to work commitments, she has decided not to renew her governorship. We will miss Gillian's eye for detail especially as our Careers Link Governor. At the start of Term 1, notification of the vacancy will formally be circulated and I look forward to receiving nominations for the vacancy. From personal experience, I can assure you that governorship is a very positive and rewarding thing to do.

There are so many positives about school life today: the numerous trips that staff have been able to arrange, sleep overs, away days, visits to the theatre as well as many visits connected to the curriculum, a curriculum that our students succeed in and the growing confidence in many of our students as they learn about life skills through these various activities. I cannot thank the staff enough for going that extra mile on numerous occasions.

On Thursday, we found ourselves at the Lost Garden of Sevenoaks and took Nuzzle and Scratch, the resident Alpacas, for a trek through the woods all the way to the top of the fourth highest hill in Kent. Some of us even danced with the Alpacas!

Trips & Visits

Bedgebury Forest Trip

As part of the trail at Bedgebury Forest, Mrs Dixon arranged an activity for the pupils to write a poem about the forest using their five senses.

As preparation, the pupils took a bit of time to listen, look around them, consider what they could taste (imagination needed here!), what they could feel and smell.

Using their ideas, they composed a five senses poem, whilst chilling out in the forest.



Mrs Hayter had set up a watercolour painting station on part of the trail at Bedgebury. The beautiful views that surrounded us and the picturesque lake made for the perfect scenery to give the students some focus.

With Mrs Hayter's guidance, the students used the tools to recreate what surrounded them, while they enjoyed the peace of the park.



Leeds Castle

While the GCSEs were taking place, Years 8 to Key Stage 5 took a trip through history at Leeds Castle.

Working together in small, mixed groups, students explored all of the beautiful grounds and the castle itself – which was first built in the 12th century. The inside of the building was decorated in 1920s style with lots of lavish furnishings and luxury household items from the period to look at.

Throughout their visit, students had a literacy-based task to complete focused on describing key things they found or discovered. More visual-focused students were encouraged to draw what they saw, too.

After lunch, the groups were challenged to complete the hedgerow maze and find the hidden, underground grotto. Then they had time to burn off the last of their energy on the castle's adventure playground before heading back to Grange Park.



Chatham Historic Dockyard

During exam week we visited Chatham Dockyards. From Year 7 to KS5, the students split up into mixed groups and explored the site.

It was a fantastic experience for the students to explore the ships and take part in a rope making exercise. They listened well during guided tours and asked lots of informative questions.



Key Stage 4 at Wrotham Arts Festival

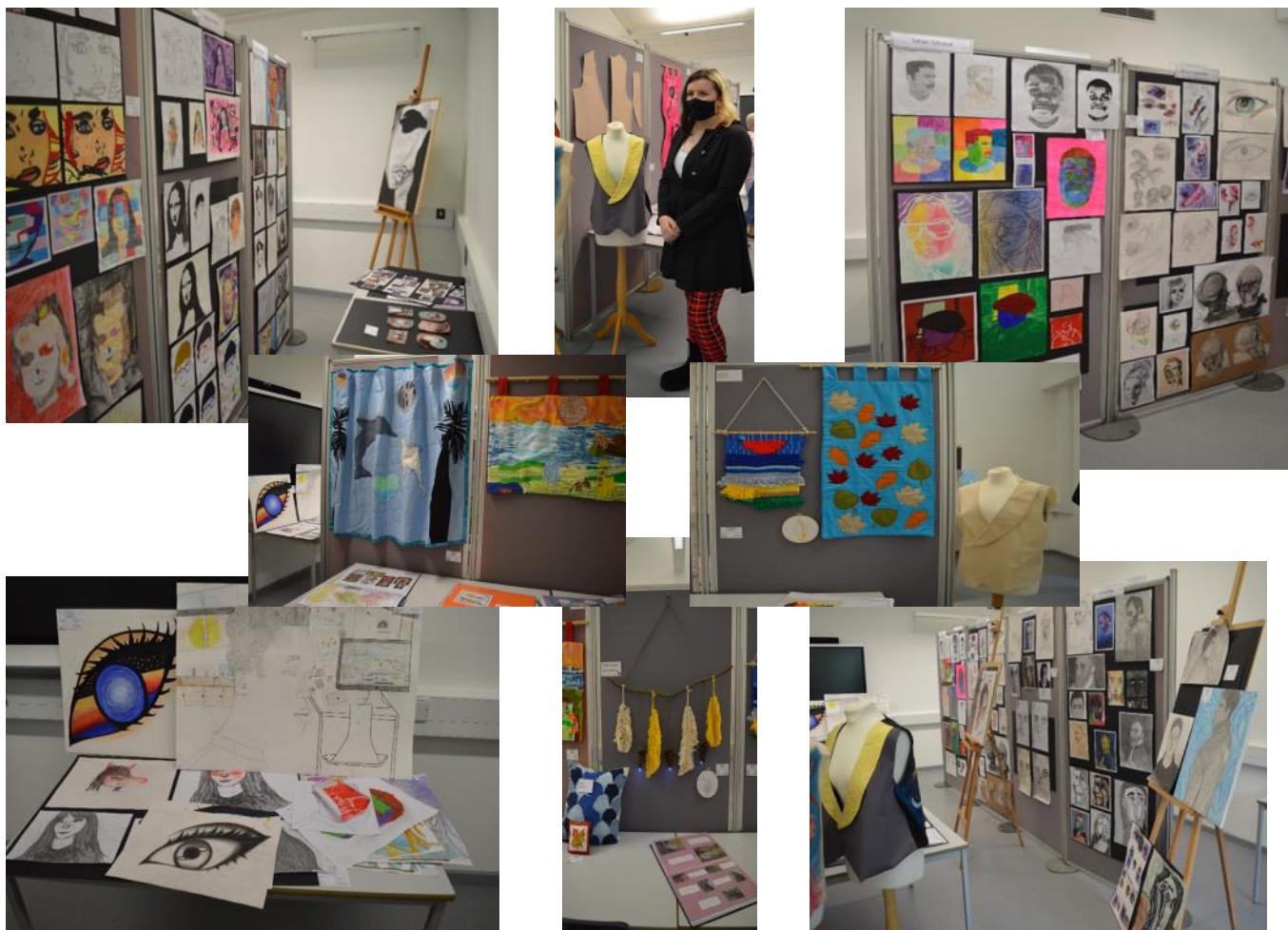
In May, Key Stage 4 took part in the Wrotham Arts Festival where some of their work was displayed in St. George's Church Wrotham.

Year 9 have finished making their masks, inspired by the history of the Benin Bronzes.



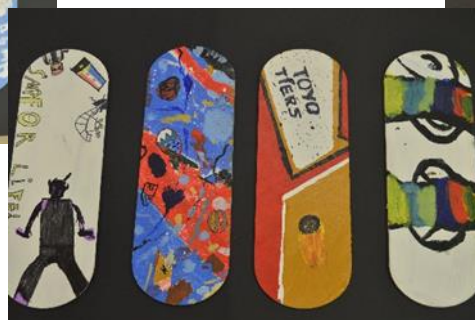

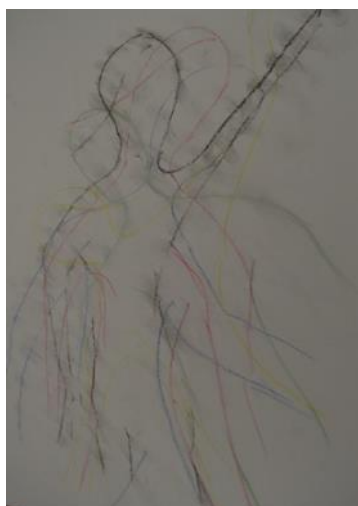

The girls started the evening setting up their rooms and getting cosy in their pyjamas, not forgetting any cuddly friends that were joining us too.



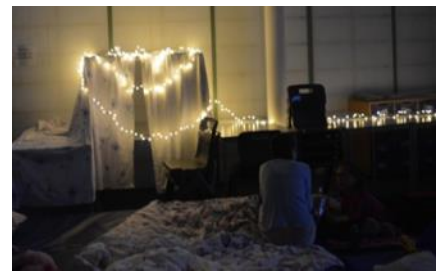
Then followed the activities: hair & beauty, baking cupcakes, playing games and arts & crafts.

Duke of Edinburgh Award

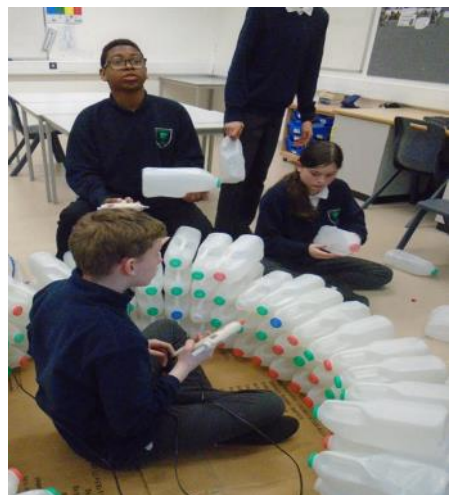
This year during enrichment time, Year 9 have been walking towards the Bronze level of the Duke of Edinburgh Award. DofE teaches you the core subjects in life: team building, resilience, confidence and, most of all, never giving up!

The first section they worked on was the 'Skill' Section. We elected this as a three month section of the course. The pupils have proved that they have broadened their understanding and increased their expertise in their chosen skill by recording their activities each week. They then add pictures and a description of that week's activity on their PowerPoint presentation, which is logged online for assessment with DofE.

There were many different focuses in this section: Learning French, Dog Handling, Film & Video Making, Engineering & Theatre & Stage.

We are currently working on the 'Physical' Section. We have selected to run this section over six months and have chosen 'Fitness: Personal Achievement' as our focus. For the first 3 months the pupils have been working on gymnastics at the Meapa with 2 specialist coaches helping them achieve their full potential. After the summer holidays they will complete the section with swimming.

The final section is the 'Expedition Section', where we do practice walks in our local parks and end with a camping trip where the pupils cook their own food.

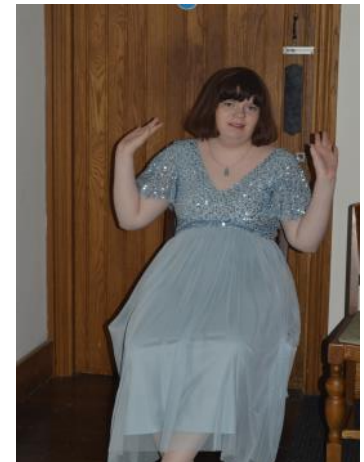
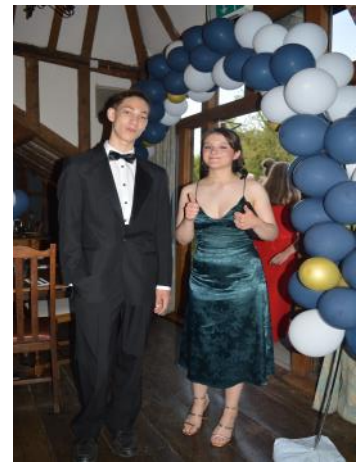

Forest School

This term we were visited by Openreach, who kindly donated the telegraph poles used to build our new all-weather canopy in the forest. Both Lee and John were impressed with our finished product and were delighted to be of help.



Part of the forest school programme requires us to develop an ecological impact plan that surveys our site and helps us achieve minimal disturbances to the environment, whilst creating a biodiverse habitat for the wildlife and students to enjoy.

In devising this plan, over the past term we have been able to plant trees, sow wild flower seeds and study new types of animals that have made home in our forest. We hope to explore this further next year with the use of wildlife cameras.

(Interoception is the sense of noticing internal body signals and connecting them to emotions)
