# Message from the Chair of Governors

Exams are over for another year and many of our pupils are "moving on" - KS5 and Year 11s left us on 30 June although a number will be returning to us in September either to college or to Wrotham. Current Year 7s will be moving on to our Wrotham site and a new group of Year 7s arrive at Stansted and so, school life goes on.

I had the great pleasure of attending Leavers Assembly at the end of June and I would like to thank our Head Pupils - Jared and Paul - for



their speeches delivered so confidently to parents/carers, pupils and staff – it certainly did bring a tear or two to the eye so well were their speeches received.

The governing body continues to be stable, working well with a number of governors having specific roles such as SEND Governor, Safeguarding, Training & Development, Health & Safety etc. We work as a team and are diligent and have the very best interests of the school at our core. Matthew Balfour and I as Co-Chairmen are settling into our new roles too and I certainly feel the benefit of the experience he brings to the table.

It was a relief that the roof repairs were finally signed off in the Spring and our hope is that the roof is finally "sound" and fit for purpose. It has been a long, hard struggle to get it sorted out with the original builders going into liquidation and a number of other firms involved in the construction of the school going to the wall. The leaks began within 12 months of the school being built and it is something of a relief that we no longer need to meet to discuss the roof and its failings.

We do need more space to cope with the expanding number of pupils we educate and to this end a planning application has been lodged with Tonbridge & Malling BC (T&MBC). Recently we were requested to supply a travel plan to aid the application deliberations and this has been forwarded to T&MBC. We now wait to see if we are successful in our application.

Compared with a number of other schools we are fully staffed and our finances are in a reasonable state with no deficit budget having to be set so far. Our buildings are in a good state of repair and are well maintained and our pupils respectful of their surroundings.

We have yet to be inspected by Ofsted but sooner or later our time will come!




# Year 7 Olympics Festival

#### Duke of Edinburgh Award

A group of Year 9 DofE pupils participated in gymnastics sessions as part of their physical section for their bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award.

These pupils went to Gymfinity in Maidstone every week across 2 terms where they learnt core gymnastics skills such as handstands, cartwheels, beam and bar work as well as how to jump over the vault. They also got to use their skills on the ninja course!

All pupils participated with enthusiasm and enjoyed using the specialist gymnastics equipment.

The team decided that our expedition goal was to look at nature and the things that humans had added, and decide whether it enhanced the natural beauty or lessened it.

The next step was a longer 8km walk at Shorne Country Park on the Explorer Trail, where they practised their navigation skills further following the correct signs around the park. The team found lots of items that humans had added and even did some litter picking along the way. We ate our lunch outside to practise for our camping trip and enjoyed a well-deserved sit down at the 'Fairy Ring'.




Last but not least was the Training day. Luckily Wrotham School allowed us to use their field so we could come back to school at lunchtime for some respite from the rain! We set up 2 gazebos for shelter and practised putting up the tents that will be used for the expedition. In the afternoon they learnt how to use a Triangia, cooking a selection of things to try before deciding on the final menu choices for the trip



After all of the training and hard work (in all weathers!), Year 10 completed their two day residential expedition. 32 kilometres walked over hilly terrain and 62,000 total steps over both days with camping, cooking, compasses and plenty of insect repellent in-between. The group were phenomenal, they boosted each other's moral and certainly learnt how to work as a team.

A proportion of the award is adapted to make it as assessable as possible for our pupils and we offer support at school to enable them to complete and record their sections, but this expedition was on par if not better than the majority of independent bronze level expeditions.

I want to take this opportunity to congratulate you, Grange Park School for your marvellous interpretation of Macbeth as part of the Spring 22/23 Shakespeare Schools Festival. It was a great night at the theatre, and I'd like to take this time here to mention a few things that I really loved!

You created a fantastic opening image which set the scene as Macbeth and Banquo approach the haunting heath. The use of energised choral speaking created a spooky atmosphere as we meet the three dramatic Witches. The repetition of 'Fair is foul and foul is fair' was performed with focus and clarity, creating a powerful and unsettling effect.

You were all so invested in the drama of the play which helped create a level of tension that is perfect for this dark tale. The strength in your physicality, reactions and vocal expression made for some really powerful scenes. Particularly impactful was the death of Lady Macbeth, followed by the very intimidating movement of Birnam Wood signalling the ultimate demise of Macbeth.

You performed the Shakespearean language brilliantly, making it your own. This was coupled with Narrator's modern day language which worked harmoniously. Every line was delivered with gusto and confidence.

I enjoyed the wide range of gestures you used throughout, such as when Malcolm was informed that 'Macbeth was right to shake him' and the ensemble echoed the line with a shaking gesture. It was wonderful how you worked beautifully together as team.

This was a haunting and dramatic Macbeth by an engaged and committed cast.

We had a lovely day exploring the zoo and it was great to see so many students seeing animals for the first time, a great success.




#### Year 10 French

#### Bon Voyage!

This term, students in our Year 10 French class have been re-enacting train journeys - in French. We converted the classroom into a mock train station, setting up a ticket desk and placing platform signs around the room.

Each pupil was given a 'Voyage Envelope' each containing their different journey details, a sheet of helpful key phrases and a stack of spending money in the form of Euros – or rather, Euro play money that we had created especially for the task. They then had to ask at the ticket office for their



'billet', find out the time and platform number of their train and then listen carefully to the amount they had to pay, before making sure they went to the correct platform. They particularly enjoyed handling all the money! Once they had carried out their given tasks they then had a go at being the station employee themselves and then ventured on to creating their own journeys. One student even abandoned the idea of going to an exciting continental destination like Toulouse or Lyon, and simply asked for a ticket to Swanley - which made us all laugh! Our student 'employé de la gare' tried to explain that he didn't think it was possible to buy a ticket to Swanley from France.


The activity was part of the Social Activities unit of the Language Pathways qualification, which has this term focused on transport. It brought together a lot of our learning, incorporating the knowledge of numbers, time and money, as well as building up listening and speaking skills. As part of this unit, students are also doing a project on Paris by producing a short guide book, as well as learning about the French Revolution to coincide with Bastille Day on 14 July.

Thank you, Grange Park, for the great year, hopefully next year will be great - I am going to Medway College to do music.




Shanley
