
Advantages

Flat


Advantages

Water and Council Tax

Every house needs water, and this is supplied by water companies. It comes to your house via pipes under the ground and you are billed for what you use.

Council Tax is how councils raise the money to pay for services in your area.

This then pays for Roads, schools, rubbish collection, street lights etc











Paying for where you live



Rent

This is an amount of money you pay for the place you live. You can rent from two main places, privately or social housing. You can pay weekly or monthly. In both cases you sign a contract to say you will pay each week/month. The flat/house will never be yours.

mortgage

This is a way to buy a house/flat of your own. You borrow an amount from a bank to buy a property and you pay it back via a mortgage. This can take anywhere from 25 years to 40 years depending on what your needs are. At the end of the payments the house is



Pat Testing

A PAT test is a routine inspection of some types of electrical appliances to check they are safe to use. Its purpose is to prevent electrical accidents in the workplace.

A full PAT test should include both a visual inspection and a more in-depth check using specialist PAT testing

PAT testing law requires that all landlords, employers, Schools. also self-employed individuals make sure that their portable electrical appliances are safe and are suitable. That they are used for the purposes intended. These appliances should always be maintained properly and remain in good working order.

Using an Iron Safe rules while Ironing

- Never leave an Iron unattended
- Always use an ironing board
- Don't stand too near the ironing board
- Keep out of children's reach
- never iron on the floor
- Put Iron safe while still hot

Using a hoover Safe rules while hoovering

- Always leave in a safe place when you have finished using
- Don't over stretch cord on the hoover
- Never hoover up water
- Turn off at the hoover, before unplugging
- Empty when full of dust
- Clean brushes as often as possible

Using a Toaster

Safe rules while using a Toaster

- Never leave a Toaster unattended
- Always turn off at the wall socket when finished
- Don't use a knife or metal item to get stuff out
- Keep out of children's reach
- never put wet stuff near or in a toaster
- Store in a safe place while still hot

Using a microwave safely Rules for using microwave

- Use the correct container size
- Check what type of container in the microwave
- Check packets for cooking time
- Check heat setting
- Use a tea towel to remove hot item



Using a washing machine safely Rules for using

- Don't over fill
- Do not put too much soap powder in.
- Check pockets of clothes
- Use correct temperature check on the clothes label
- Do not open door if you can see water inside

Using a kettle safely Rules for using Kettle

- Do not over fill
- Only half fill if too heavy when full
- Only put water in no other liquid
- Remember steam will come out of the top
- Don't leave wire hanging down when on the side
- Turn off at the wall when finished

Using a Tumble dryer safely Rules for using dryer Reason


- Do not over fill
- Only damp clothes should be put in
- Check heat settings
- Check labels on clothes
- Check wire and plug often
- Turn off at the wall when finished
- Clean fluff out
